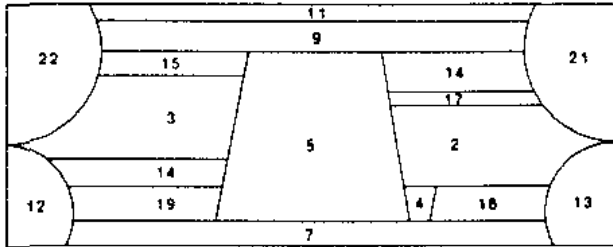


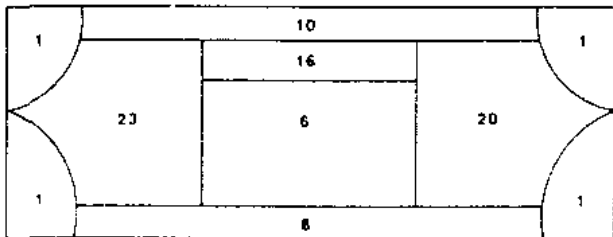

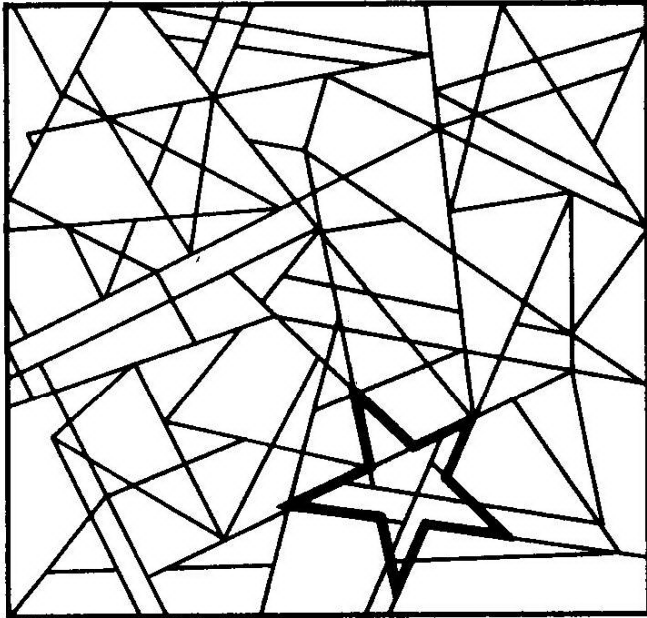

## The Physics of Crossing the Red Sea

**1. MAGNET CAR:** (c) The force of the magnet pulling on the iron car is counterbalanced by the force of the iron car pulling on the magnet. Since the magnet is attached to the car through the boy, the two forces in effect cancel each other, and no work is done.

**2. COLD BATH:** (c) The weight of the water displaced by the iceberg exactly equals the weight of the iceberg. When it turns back into water, it fits exactly into the volume of water it displaced when it was an iceberg.

**3. RUBBER BULLET:** (a) The momentum of the aluminum bullet is transferred completely to the block, which supplies the necessary impulse to stop it. But for the rubber bullet, the block supplies not only the impulse necessary to stop it, it also provides enough additional impulse to "throw the bullet back." Depending on the elasticity of the rebound, this results in up to twice the impulse for the impact of the rubber bullet, and therefore up to twice the momentum is imparted to the block. So the rubber bullet is more likely to knock it over.

**4. GOING DOWN:** (b) Because water is practically incompressible, its density near the surface is the same as it is deeper down. Thus, the buoyant force needed to hold the boulder is the same regardless of the boulder's depth.

**5. TURNING CART WHEELS:** (a) The left wheel is the first to encounter the grass, so it is the first to be slowed. The right wheel remains at its greater speed on the sidewalk until it meets the grass. When both wheels are on the grass, they again move in a straight line.

**6. BOTTLENECK:** (b) Water flows faster in

narrow parts and slows in wide parts, just as in a creek.

**7. TOUGH NUT:** (b) The screw and the nut are not completely in contact; there is a small space between them. For the very tight nut the problem is that this space is too small. How can it be increased? By heat. Heat will make everything expand: the nut, the screw, and the space between them. So to loosen the nut, heat it.

**8. CAROUSEL:** (b) By the time the ball reaches the other side of the carousel, Danny will have moved to the left of where the ball was thrown. Thus, it will pass to the right of him.

**9. JAR OF FLIES:** (c) The weight depends on the mass of the jar, and the position of the flies does not change that. Their weight in flight is transmitted to the bottom of the jar by the air currents generated by their wings.

**10. CREAM IT:** (a) You should add the cream right away. The hotter a body is, compared with its surroundings, the greater the rate at which it cools. (Newton's law of cooling: a hot body cools faster, degree for degree, than a warm body.) So by adding the cream right away, you reduce the cooling rate of the coffee during the interval before drinking time. If you wait, the hot coffee will cool fast, and when you finally add the cream, you'll bring the temperature down even further.

**11. TORQUE:** (b) No. Attaching the rope merely increases the distance from the bolt to the location of the applied force; it doesn't increase the leverage. For more torque, Harry needs either a longer wrench or more pull.

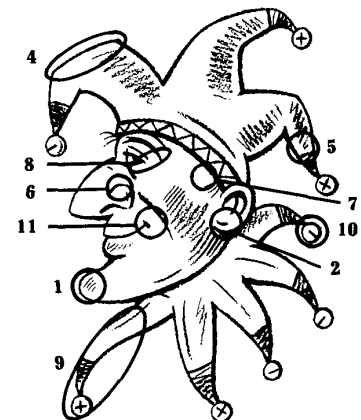

## Baseball in Egypt?

The All-Stars scored twice as many runs in their fourth inning as in their first three combined. Their first three innings must contain at least six ( $1 + 2 + 3$ ) runs, so their fourth inning must be 12 runs. Their first three innings are therefore 1, 2, and 3 in some order.

Since there are two innings after the fourth, but only one number after TWELVE alphabetically (namely, TWO), it must be the Titans, not the All-Stars, who scored their numbers of runs in alphabetical order.

The two teams were only a run apart after five innings. The most the All-Stars could have after the fifth inning is 29 runs ( $1 + 2 + 3 + 11 + 12$ ). The fewest the Titans could have is 30 runs ( $4 + 5 + 6 + 7 + 8$ ). So those must have been the scores. Of the remaining two numbers, NINE and TEN, only TEN comes alphabetically after all of the Titans' other scores. So the Titans' scores, in order, were: 8, 5, 4, 7, 6, and 10. The All-Stars' scores were: (1, 2, 3 in some order), 12, 11, and 9. Since the Titans won 40–38, they are the home team.

The All-Stars, who are the visiting team, scored at least three runs in the first inning and two in the third, so their first three innings scored 3, 1, and 2 runs.

The final scoreboard read:

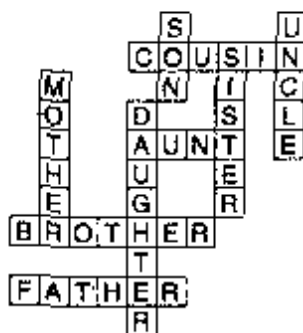

## 40 Years of TV Reruns?

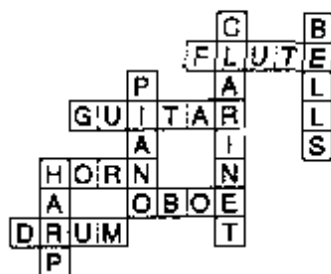
These are the 12 errors: The ace of spades is printed sideways; the 10 of clubs is played on the jack of spades (black suit on black); three cards shown—the 11 of clubs, the 4 of stars, and the 1 of diamonds—don't exist; the 4 of hearts is shown among the foundation cards, while the 3 of hearts, upon which the 4 must have been played, is still in the tableau; the jack of clubs has a queen's face; one card in the sixth column has the wrong back; the 10 of spades is played on the queen of hearts; the seventh column has too many face-down cards; the 10 of hearts appears twice; the two middle pips of the 7 of clubs are upside-down.

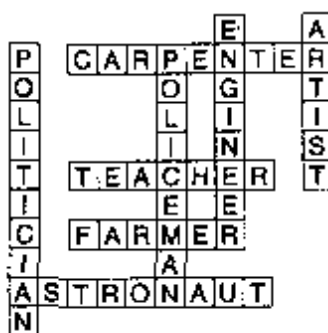

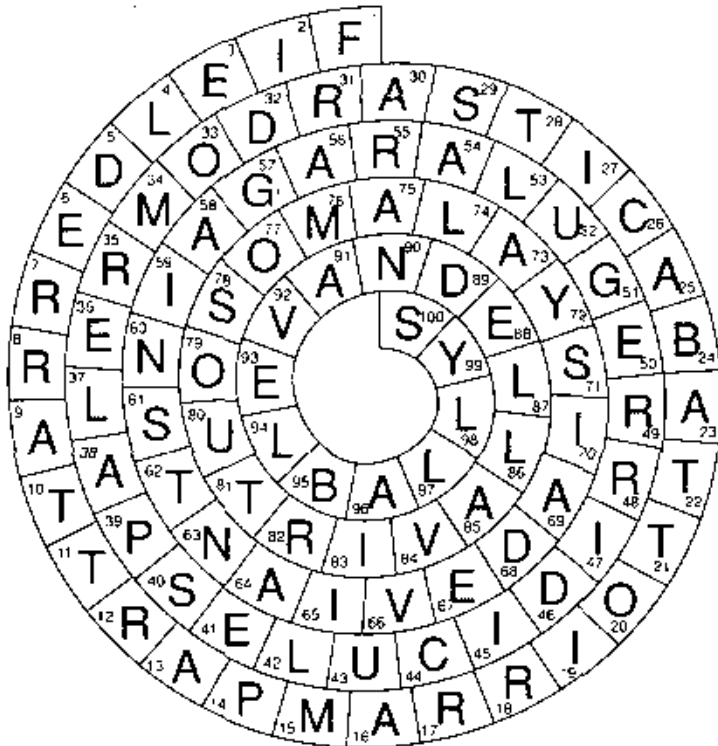

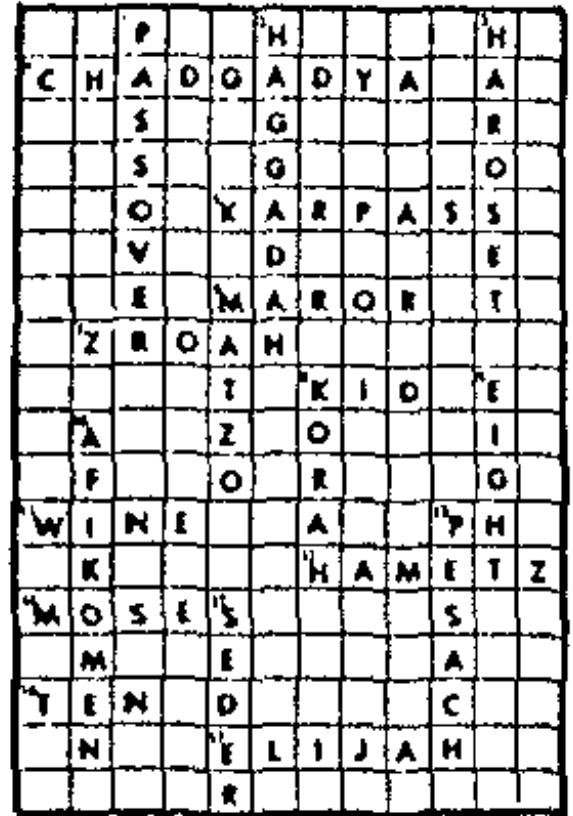
